President's Message

During the lifetime of our organization the housing stock has almost doubled in age. For many of us this has made possible a life style that our friends in the suburbs can never experience. For others the availability of large older homes has meant an opportunity for speculation that has been both a liability and an asset to the community.

Anyone who has been to meetings over the past several years knows that the community club maintains an active and effective rode in preserving the existing zoning and land use patterns. This interest should be continued; we cannot reasonably expect any city administration to care as much about Highland Park as we do.

We could probably limit our interest to its present level and Highland Park would continue to be a desirable place to life. But, if we increase our involvement to include positive as well as vigilant actions, there is no question that the community would be an even better place to live.

At our last meeting Dell Ziegler presented a proposal for one such activity. This proposal, which was adopted, provides an incentive for individuals to improve personal and community property. It is one of the many things we should be doing.

In discussions with other members some other ideas have come up. One

of these is to sponsor a code enforcement program. Enforcement of the building code is the ongoing responsibility of the city. Generally the codes are enforced when there is a complaint. In a code enforcement program, an area or neighborhood is designated for concentrated activity; each house is inspected for code violations and mechanisms are set up to rectify the violations which are discovered. There are many advantages and some drawbacks implicit in the program. Some of these are:

- 1) Individual residents are inconvenienced by the inspections.
- 2) Owners who rent to numbers of tenants in excess of the occupancy allowed are discovered and must come into compliance.
- Some owners may incur expenses in bringing their property up to standard, but
- Owners who are in need may be eligible for very low interest loans or outright grants for improvements.
- 5) The general quality and safety of the housing, particularly for tenants would improve.
- 6) The level of repair and maintenance, already high, would improve--unforseen maintenance problems might be prevented.
- 7) The program would probably serve as a catalyst for further investment in property improvements.

Experts in code enforcement agree that concentrated efforts yield the best

results in middle income communities with an older, but basically sound and well maintained, housing stock.

Code enforcement is not the only positive step our club could take. Ιt may not even be the best, but it is

one of the many things we should consider that may be of interest to the membership.
