Current Events at Peabody

Once again, we here at Peabody High School submit, for your reading pleasure: *Peabody's Current Events*. These are accomplishments, mainly on the part of the students, that we feel deserve recognition by the Highland Park community, of which Peabody is a part. And so, without further adieu:

Mock Trial: Mr. David Rennhoff prepared a team of about 10 students for a mock trial, which took place at the Allegheny County Courthouse. Peabody's team narrowly defeated Upper St. Clair High School's team by 2/10 of a point.

Peer Mediation Training: On January 14, four students from Peabody participated in peer mediation training for teachers, which took place at Connelley Skills Learning Center. Seniors Crystal McKee, Jamie Bennett, Keith Brockman, and Darryl Weston were lead by Mrs. Cathy Drago, and presented a brief discussion of their experiences in mediation to the teachers in attendance.

Scholarships: Two Peabody seniors have been given full athletic scholarships for college. Darryl Weston was awarded a scholarship for the University of Pittsburgh, and Trenton Jones received a scholarship for the University of Connecticut.

Microsoft Certification: Griffin Lewis, a ninth grader at Peabody and one of the students attending the February 17 HPCC meeting, passed the Microsoft **WORD** *Proficient User* certification test with the highest score in the school. He scored 964 out of a possible 1000 on the test. Griffin is one of 15 students who have passed a Microsoft Certification examination in the Information Technologies Academy to date. These certifications are nationally recognized as the standard in business and industry.

CAS Open House: On March 6, 2000, there will be an open house for Peabody's Center for Advanced Studies (CAS) program. From the February 21, 2000 Pittsburgh Post Gazette:

On This Date

100 Years ago (Wednesday, Feb. 21, 1900)

Ambulance drivers counted 21 children scattered at the bottom of Sheridan Avenue near Stanton in the East End — the youngsters had piled themselves onto a long, steel-runner bob-sled above Wellesley Avenue for a fast and bumpy downhill coast, but they'd crashed halfway down when the steering bar broke as the sled passed Robley Alley. Three girls and one boy had to be treated by doctors for serious cuts, while the rest, sporting bruises and bumps, were able to walk back home.
