Each year we have about 100 families participating and we have distributed about 600-750 maps to buyers. We have volunteers who hand them to people at two street corners in the neighborhood and we leave bunches at several stores. These buyers come from near - sometimes your next door neighbors - and far, to browse and generally visit Highland Park. It is a great way to bring people to our neighborhood and show them just how welcoming we can be.

BLIND ARTIST SELECTED FOR PHILLY EXHIBIT

What would you paint if you could not see? For Highland Park resident and artist Mary Ellen Jesse, this is not a rhetorical question. Mary Ellen is a self-taught painter who has been legally blind since birth. She was born with congenital cataracts and developed glaucoma. Despite her minimal vision, she has always loved to draw and paint and has been painting acrylics and watercolors since her early 20's.

Recently, Mary Ellen was notified that her painting, entitled "S. Maria di Trastevere" was selected by jurors to be part of the upcoming show of the National Exhibits by Blind Artists, scheduled to take place in Philadelphia in September. The exhibit will be part of the Philadelphia Art Alliance Satellite Gallery.

Mary Ellen paints by holding enlarged photographs of her subjects two to three inches from her eyes. It is a painstaking and long process, but Mary Ellen enjoys the creativity and expression that painting provides for her.

She began painting for her own pleasure, then began to give her works to friends and family members as gifts. "They liked them so much, everyone thought that I should have an exhibit. I never expected anything like that, but it happened," she recalls.

Bookworks Cafe, in Glenshaw, was the site of Mary Ellen's first local exhibit, in 1999.

Her paintings are vividly colored interpretations of landscapes, churches, floral arrangements and animals. Some of her ideas come from her mother, Marge Runco, also of Highland Park, who is an amateur photographer.

Mary Ellen was born and raised in Highland Park, in a large family with a strong creative tradition. She is one of the eight children of Dr. Angelo and Marge Runco, who have resided for many years on Heberton Street. Dr. Runco is a pediatrician whose practice was located on North Highland Avenue for many years.

In 1996, Mary Ellen was honored by the American Printing House for the Blind when she entered her first juried competition and won an award. Her entry was chosen from a field of several hundred and was displayed at the Kentucky State Fair.

Mary Ellen also creates beautiful, one-of-a-kind, hand painted greeting cards. The cards are suitable for framing and make wonderful gifts for special occasions. These greeting cards so impressed the staff at the New Vision Gallery in Louisville, Kentucky that they, too, invited her to submit paintings for their gallery. They have selected four of her paintings and will exhibit them during the Kentucky Derby. New Vision is the only art gallery in the country that shows the work of blind artists exclusively.

For Mary Ellen, "Painting is a way of overcoming my visual limitation. It allows me to feel like I'm on an equal footing with others. It is one of my life's greatest pleasures."

Mary Ellen is married and lives with her husband, Alan, who is also blind, and their two dogs. She also enjoys poetry and is a regular listener of the weekly poetry program, Prosody, on WYEP.

April 19th Meeting Highlights

Meeting Called to order at 7:30 P.M.

C.O.P.: Officer Scalise reported that crime statistics have continued to be good. She reminded residents to call the Zone 5 Station when planning a vacation and request additional surveillance of their homes. Also please leave a key with a neighbor to permit emergency entrance, if necessary. There will be a city-wide bulk pickup on April 21 and Operation Clean Sweep will take place in Highland Park on June 5. Some questions were asked about shots fired at Euclid and Wellesley but there is little information available at this time.

Reports:

Finance Committee: Dell Ziegler reminded members that the bylaws require submission of budgets by each committee and the development of an overall annual budget for the club. In addition, ad hoc expenditures greater than \$250.00 require approval of the Finance Committee. Therefore, no further checks will be issued by the Treasurer unless prior approval has been obtained.

Banners: Mitch Kates reported that although the design is complete, there is a problem with the cost of installation. He is exploring funding sources to defray this cost. The goal is to have them on display by Marathon Day.

Children's Committee: The Easter Egg Hunt was a great success. Tania expressed thanks to all who helped in setting up and running it. Tania is exploring new ideas such as a scarecrow contest in combination with the Halloween Parade. The Farmhouse will be ready for Day Camp with the new playground theme being barnyard animals.

Newsletter: A decision will be required in the May meeting whether to have a mass mailing of the July issue. The July issue has been mailed to all residents for at least the last three years to promote new members.

Welcoming: More than two hundred new bags have been ordered. Welcoming continues to be a success; thanks to Bob Staresinic.

Special Event: Salsa in the Park will take place Sunday, May 20, at the Rhododendron Pavilion in the park. Latin dance instruction will be provided (3:30 - 4:30) followed by dancing to the music of a ten piece Latin orchestra (4:30 - 7:30). Residents and their friends should bring a picnic basket and their favorite salsa for a best salsa contest. Invitations will be mailed to residents.

Reservoir of Jazz: Reservoir of Jazz Concerts will be held at a new time this year; they will begin at 5:00 P.M. The concerts, to be held the four Sundays of August, will feature Joe Negri, Kenny Blake, Roger Humphries and the PSO Jazz Quartet.

Discussion:

The East End Cooperative Ministry is requesting a donation for this year's E'Fest. The Finance Committee will review and report back next month.

On May 9th, a dog show will take place at Dillworth Traditional Academy. Different breeds and demonstrations will be featured.

A luncheon with Mayor Tom Murphy discussing plans for East Liberty revitalization will be held April 26 at 11:45 A.M.. The cost is \$15.00 per person.

The HPCDC/HPCC web page is being updated to replace obsolete announcements with current information.

A suggestion was made for residents to walk their dogs on Mellon Street to discourage open air drug trafficking which may be taking place.

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Farmhouse & Playground Update

At the initial community meeting on March 21, good feedback on the playground and the use of the Farmhouse was received from the community. Chet Malesky, Assistant Director, Department of General Services gave a quick summary of the work:

A portion of the second floor structure that was heavily damaged by the fire was replace as was a portion of the roof deck. New shingles were installed on both the main roof and the porch roofs. DGS carpenters rebuilt all of the brackets and trim under the eave, all the exterior doors and a new balustrade and rail on the inside stairway. New vinyl windows have been installed throughout, and a security system will allow the heavy screens to be removed from the lower windows. The second floor has been opened up into two large rooms, and new water service has been installed. The Farm house has been completely rewired, including new light fixtures; all interior walls have been painted and new vinyl tile floors have been installed throughout. Other than replacing the sink in the main room on the first floor and a new powder room on the second floor, no other fixtures have been replaced at this time. The exterior paint contains lead and it will be stripped down to a sound surface, sealed and repainted. The community can have input on the colors.

The following items were, if not consensus, at least the leanings of the group.

Farmhouse: The park visitor center should not be at the Farmhouse due to traffic concerns of Grafton and Heberton residents. Some presence which will allow the toilet rooms to be available for playground and ball field users is desired. No strong preference for color - only that it should not be red. One Heberton neighbor suggested pale yellow with white trim. No strong desire for computer lab. Would like to have building available for reservation/rental, similar to picnic shelters. The idea of having HPCC and HPCDC offices on the second floor was well received. City Parks will develop a proposal for programs which can be offered in the Farmhouse. This will take about 10 weeks and can be presented at another public meeting.

Playground: Lisa Vavro, Landscape Architect with Engineering and Construction presented two playground schemes. She collected input and will develop an finalized scheme. A farm theme was suggested for the designs in the rubber paving. General Parking for the ball field and traffic near the playground are concerns. Possible solutions are closing the connecting drive to the south and east of the Farmhouse to thru traffic and allowing parking within the maintenance yard and possibly demolishing the steel building to allow for more parking accessible from the drive behind home plate.

Following that meeting, Lisa asked for a follow-up meeting to present the developed plan. This was held on April 9 at the Farmhouse. All who attended the first meeting as well as others who had expressed interest were invited. Lisa shared the new scheme which incorporated the comments from the earlier meeting. She received further input on benches, picnic tables, separation of the toddler area from the drive, and colors. She noted that she was attempting to put the project out to bid in May which would allow construction to begin in the fall to be complete before winter. The parking/access issue was discussed again and Lisa will carry the message back to the parties in control of such things. The group also toured the inside of the farmhouse and discussed colors. A pale yellow with white trim and green doors color scheme was displayed and most felt it would look good. But Engineering and Construction is concerned that the pale yellow may not cover well and will be difficult to maintain considering graffiti and chipping. They are suggesting either a pale terra-cotta color or a sage green. The neighborhood group will discuss this and respond to them.

Ray Klimco, the Project Manager from General Services, feels that the Farmhouse should be complete soon and should be usable for Day Camp. Hannah Ehrlich of the Mayor's office has been asked to press for repair of the existing playground equipment for this season so it is at least as safe as it can be. She has also been asked to contact the elections department to move the polling place back in for the fall election (it is too late for the primary).

Everyone from the City has done a great job. Chet Malesky, Ray Klimco and the carpenters and other tradespeople from General Services have been very cooperative, and have done a very professional job within the confines of the limited budget and scope (basically repair of fire damage with the insurance settlement and some additional funding from Jim Ferlo and Director Ashley). Hannah Ehrlich has marshaled the efforts of Engineering and Construction and City Parks relative to the playground and programming for the Farmhouse, and all of those folks have been responsive and creative. A good relationship has been forged with them and all can continue to work together to make the Farmhouse and the park a real asset to the

neighborhood.

Highland Park Summer Day Camp

The Highland Park Community Club has been providing a summer program for children for over fifty years. If you are unfamiliar with H.P.C.C. Day Camp you are really missing a neighborhood gem. Our program runs for six weeks each summer from 9:00 am to 12:00. This year we are in session from June 25 to August 3rd

Parents are free to choose which weeks they are interested in and can sign up for one or all six weeks.

The campers range in age from four through eight years of age. They spend their mornings in small, age appropriate, groups working on activities/ projects or engaged in gross motor activity. We take advantage of the park surroundings and hike to different pavilions for a change of pace and equipment. On Tuesdays and Thursdays we spend an hour swimming in the small Highland Park pool. We are swimming by permit so we are usually the only group in the pool at that time and the city does staff it with a lifeguard. The pool is only three feet deep at its deepest point so if your child does not know how to swim it's not a problem.

We will be based at the Farmhouse this year, the building is close to completion and I'm told it will be ready for camp. The cost for campers will be \$60.00 a week for HPCC members and \$70.00/wk for non-members. This year we are instituting a late registration policy, if you register your child for day camp after the 1St of June it will cost you an additional \$5.00 / week (for each child). A membership to the club is only \$20.00 and entitles you to the monthly newsletter for the whole year as well as the discounted day camp rate.
