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# May 17, 2001 Meeting Highlights

President Tania Grubbs called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM.

**C.O.P** (Community Oriented Police) Officer Christine Scalise reported that was no major crime in the neighborhood in the last month. Her hours are Monday – Friday, 3PM – 11PM. The C.O.P. office is next to Peppi's on Bryant St. Officer Scalise reported on a brush fire that was set on the Hampton paper street off of Pinkerton Way. The Mayor's Service Center is investigating and will place "No Dumping" signs and has been asked to clear the lot of accumulated debris. Residents can call the city to get a "No Dumping Area" sign. Building Inspection will investigate and approve the signage. The Mayor's Service Center can also be reached at #255-2621 to request street lighting, speed signs, and other improvements.

On June 5<sup>th</sup> will be a Clean Sweep in Highland Park. Report abandoned vehicles to be removed. The Pittsburgh Zoo conducted a Safety Day on May 18<sup>th</sup>. Non-uniformed police are patrolling the park and making arrests for illegal activity including drinking alcohol without a permit.

#### **Committee Reports:**

House Tour: The House Tour Committee has 5 confirmed houses for the Fall Harvest House Tour but still needs more houses/apartments/condos. Please call Chair Dana Thomas at 655-2992 to volunteer your home or to join the committee.

Children's Activities: Chair Tania Grubbs reported that there would be children's activities at the neighborhood Salsa Party including instrument making, a pinata and supervised recreation. Snacks and drinks provided.

Commercial District: Tania reported that the Marathon Party was a huge success again this year. Runners comment on the band and festivities and how important it is as they are about to "hit the wall." Muzz Meyers was thanked for putting together another festive, well-attended event that shows off the neighborhood in a very positive way.

Day Camp: Chair Janice Burgett reported that plans are progressing. She is hoping that the pool fees will remain the same for this year. There is still some concern about the Farmhouse being completed in time for the first week of camp due to the exterior painting.

Newsletter: Editor Ollie Rieley reported that July will be the annual mass mailing to all Highland Park households and will once again include a membership offer for new members at the introductory rate of \$5.00. The annual mass mailing serves as a way to publicize the work of the HPCC and HPCDC to Highland Park residents who are not members. # **Highland Park Summer Day Camp**

The Highland Park Community Club has been providing a summer program for children for over fifty years. If you are unfamiliar with H.P.C.C. Day Camp you are really missing a neighborhood gem. Our program runs for six weeks each summer from 9:00 am to 12:00. This year we are in session from June 25 to August 3<sup>rd</sup>. Parents are free to choose which weeks they are interested in and can sign up for one or all six weeks.

The campers range in age from four through eight years of age. They spend their mornings in small, age appropriate, groups working on activities/ projects or engaged in gross motor activity. We take advantage of the park surroundings and hike to different pavilions for a change of pace and equipment. On Tuesdays and Thursdays we spend an hour swimming in the small Highland Park pool. We are swimming by permit so we are usually the only group in the pool at that time and the city does staff it with a lifeguard. The pool is only three feet deep at its deepest point so if your child does not know how to swim it's not a problem.

We will be based at the Farmhouse this year, the building is close to completion and I'm told it will be ready for camp. The cost for campers will be \$60.00 a week for HPCC members and \$70.00/wk for non-members. **This year we are instituting a late registration policy, if you register your child for day camp after the 1**<sup>st</sup> of **June it will cost you an additional \$5.00 / week (for each child).** A membership to the club is only \$20.00 and entitles you to the monthly newsletter for the whole year as well as the discounted day camp rate. 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# WHAT TO DO IF YOU LOSE YOUR PURSE OR WALLET

(Editor's Note: We received the following via one of those chain e-mails, normally reserved for jokes, or "feel-good" stories. Neither Betty nor I have experienced a "loss-of-wallet-accident" for years, but it was traumatic when it happened even years ago and must be worse now. We do know two people who were robbed of their purses in Europe last year and we know that in both cases they had a difficult time recovering. This sounds like good advice and I checked the phone numbers at the end and they are valid. It's written first person and the name is in the original; I chose to rwemove the name. Read and beware!)

We've all heard horror stories about fraud that's committed using your name, address, Social Security Number, credit, etc.

Unfortunately I have firsthand knowledge, because my wallet was stolen last month and within a week the thieve(s) ordered an expensive monthly cell phone package, applied for a VISA credit card, had a credit line approved to buy a Gateway computer, received a PIN number from DMV to change my driving record information online, and more.

But here's some critical information to limit the damage in case this happens to you or someone you know. As everyone always advises, cancel your credit cards immediately, but the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know who to call. Keep those where you can find them easily (having to hunt for them is additional stress you WON'T need at that point)! On a personal note, I remember losing a Master Card and until I got the toll free number from information and called, I was a wreck.

File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where it was stolen, this proves to credit providers you were diligent, and is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

But here's what is perhaps most important: I never ever thought to do this. Call the three national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and Social Security Number. I had never heard of doing that until advised by a bank that called to tell me an application for credit was made over the Internet in my name. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

By the time I was advised to do this, almost two weeks after the theft, the damage had been done (there are records of all the credit checks initiated by the thieves' purchases, none of which I knew about before placing the alert). Since then, no additional damage has been done, and the thieves threw my wallet away this weekend (someone turned it in). It seems to have stopped them in their tracks.
