UNION PROJECT HOLDS COMMUNITY DAY

TO MARK START OF EAST END CHURCH'S RESTORATION

The Union Project is beginning restoration work at the former Union Baptist Church, which stands at the corner of Negley and Stanton Avenues and the literal intersection of three neighborhoods - East Liberty, Highland Park, and Morningside. This prominent community landmark has recently been purchased by The Union Project, a group of neighborhood residents who plan to restore the building and open it for use by local artists, community builders, and faith groups.

On Saturday, November 10, the Union Project will host a Community Day. Beginning with a flea-market from 8 - 1, the building will be open for tours all day until 4:30. There will be opportunity to talk with Union Project representatives about the project. Baked goods, hot lunch food, and drinks will be available.

Events include an art exhibit and silent auction with all proceeds benefitting the restoration. Local artists exhibiting and selling work include nationally celebrated ceramic artists Cynthia Young, Joshua Green, and Dale Huffman. Photography, watercolor, and other visual art will also be shown and sold. All-day music performances include local artists Coal Train, Heather Kropf, JG Boccella, the Keith Hershberger Trio, and more. At 1:00 p.m., there will be a short informational program to introduce the community to the plans and goals of the Union Project. The Union Project primarily consists of Pittsburgh young adults who have moved to the city in recent years. Most have participated in the one-year voluntary service program, Mennonite Urban Corps, which strives to connect recent college graduates with work placements in community building, peacemaking, and the arts. The program is housed on Stanton Avenue, neighboring the

church building. This project is an outgrowth of this group's collective years of work in Pittsburgh as youth mentors, potters, singers/songwriters, tutors, neighborhood residents, non-profit administrators, photographers, writers, builders, painters, researchers, and pastors. While this group of Mennonites has been the initial impetus of the Union Project, it is becoming more importantly a collaboration with community leaders from churches, neighborhood groups, community development corporations, and local schools.

The Union Project invites all our neighbors to visit us on November 10 and tour the facilities.

It will be, truly, a "November to Remember" for all at St. Andrew's, with many opportunities for folks in the wider neighborhood and community to participate in some enjoyable and very meaningful events.

A highlight of the month will be on Friday evening, November 9, at 8 p.m., with the fourth Annual St. Andrew's Lecture, featuring this year a presentation by Mr. George L. Miles, Jr., President and C.E.O. of WQED-Pittsburgh on "Connecting with Community." The traditional reception following the lecture will be catered by Enrico's Tazza d'Oro, and the reception hall will feature art work by Highland Park artist Alfonso Sloan of the Gallery Sloanique on Bryant Street.

Also of great interest during November will be the visit on the weekend of November 16-18 of the Rt. Rev. and Mrs. David K. Leighton, in celebration of our annual "St. Andrew's Day" observance. Bishop Leighton was Rector of St. Andrew's from 1956 - 1959 and served in later years as Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland. On Friday evening, November 16th, at 8 p.m., in St. Andrew's Parish Hall we will host "An Evening of Remembrance" in conversation with David and Carolyn Leighton, discussing their memories of life at St. Andrew's and in the Highland Park neighborhood during the later 1950's. All are invited to join us for this evening, and a "potluck" dessert reception will follow. Bishop Leighton will also be the Guest Preacher at St. Andrew's 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. services on Sunday morning, the 18th, as the sounds of the Syria Highlanders Pipe and Drum Band waft over the rooftops of the neighborhood.

A Choral Service of Holy Communion is scheduled at St. Andrew's on "Thanksgiving Eve," Wednesday, November 21st, at 8 p.m., with the singing of traditional harvest hymns. It is customary at this service to add to our offertory with a contribution of non-perishable food for the East End Food Bank.

We mark our calendars as well for the "First Thursday in December," December 6th, at 8 p.m., with Choral Evensong for Advent, and a very special recital by the Urban Sky Consort--a remarkable ensemble, long-time friends of St. Andrew's, dedicated to early music composed by and/or for women.

ST. ANDREW'S LECTURE

The Fourth Annual St. Andrew's Lecture will take place on Friday evening, November 9, at 8 p.m.

Our featured Speaker this year will be Mr. George L. Miles, Jr., President and C.E.O. of WQED-Pittsburgh.

Mr. Miles's lecture, "Connecting with Community: Past, Present, and Future" will explore the relationship between the dynamic and fluid commuity and communities of our region and the institutions of the media--with of course a special emphasis on the evolving role of public broadcasting.

Mr. Miles, a graduate of Seton Hall University, with an MBA from Farleigh Dickinson University, has served in his present position at WQED since 1994. Previously, he held senior positions at WNET, New York, and with Westinghouse Broadcasting and Cable.

This event promises to be of great interest, and all are invited.

Mr. Miles follows Dr. John Murray (1998), President of Duquesne University, the Hon. Sala Udin (1999), Pittsburgh City Councilman and civic rights leader, and the Very Rev. George L. W. Werner (2000), retired Dean of Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, in presenting the St. Andrew Lecture, which is an annual event to bring prominent community leaders to address important issues and values of public life.

A festive reception follows the Lecture, and each year it has become our custom to feature a neighborhood or area visual artist in Brooks Hall. This year's featured artist will be Alfonso Sloan, whose gallery "Sloanique" is located just a block from the church, at the corner of North St. Clair and Bryant. The reception will be catered by Enrico's Tazza d'Oro, our neighborhood coffee house.
