HPCC May 16 Meeting Minutes

President Brandon Weber called the meeting to order at 7:35 P.M.

Brandon reported that the Finance Committee reported an income of \$26,125.00 and expenses of \$26,835.00 for this fiscal year. Councilman Ferlo's office gave a grant of \$5,000.00, which will be considered income in fiscal year 2003.

Brandon reported on mail received by the HPCC. Volkswagen Pedal Pittsburgh 2002, a Historic Review of the Micro-filtration water plant, and Venture Outdoor Festival.

Tania Grubbs reported on the Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy BioBlitz and the HPCC's sponsored Picnic in the Park. Both events will be held near the Reservoir on Saturday May 18th.

Janice Burgett reported that the HPCC Day Camp would be held at the Farm House this year. There will be a ribbon cutting ceremony in celebration of the new playground at the Farm House on the opening day of camp, June 24th. Janice will secure the pool and Farm House permits this month. There is also a question of tuition adjustment if there are many siblings in one family.

Kate Zober reported progress on the Super Playground. She has revisited the playground and sees some improvement; however, there are still broken tires, and protruding bolts on some equipment. She has contacted City Parks again. She is also acquiring estimates for surfacing of the Super Playground with either mulch or a rubberized material.

Joseph Preston, District 24 Representative spoke, asking for the Highland Park vote. Patrick Dowd, Highland Park resident and opponent for Representative Prestons's seat, also spoke about his candidacy and platform issues.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 PM.

The International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) Pennsylvania-Delaware Chapter will be hosting this year's Western Tree Climbing Championship on Saturday, June 1, 2002 in the City of Pittsburgh's Highland Park. Sign-in for the contestants will begin at 8:00am with the actual competition beginning at 8:30am. The contestants will test their climbing skills in selected trees at the site for the events of the daylong competition. Also present will be arboricultural vendors, informational booths for the ISA and the Utility Arborist Association (UAA), the Pittsburgh Shade Tree Commission, and other tree-related interests plus food and refreshment vendors. There will be entertainment for children at the Kid's Climb.

For those unfamiliar with this event, the first ISA Tree Trimmer's Jamboree was founded in 1976 and held in St. Louis, Missouri. The event was established to preserve classic climbing skills, so that in the event of a real-life aerial rescue of a tree worker in trouble, a climber with nothing more than a rope could assist and possibly save a life. The event, now referred to as the Tree Climbing Championship (TCC), has become an internationally recognized opportunity for professional arborists to promote safe working practices, demonstrate improvements and innovations in equipment and techniques, and provide industry recognition to the public. It also serves as an opportunity to formally recognize skilled climbers and the important role they play in the profession of tree care.

Each year, 38 worldwide ISA Chapters plus members-at-large in 26 countries not having local Chapters, hold TCC's to select a climber to represent the Chapter at the International TCC held in conjunction with the ISA Annual Conference. This year's ISA Annual Conference will be held July 27-31 in Seattle, Washington. The competitors are selected as a result of their demonstrated superior abilities in local championships like the one to be held in Pittsburgh on June 1st. At both the local and international TCC's, the contestants compete in five preliminary events to qualify as one of the top five contestants who earn the right to move into the championship round. The preliminary events include the Work

Climb, Aerial Rescue, Throwline, Belayed Speed Climb, and Secured Footlock, followed by the final championship round of the day, the Master's Challenge.

Our City of Pittsburgh has been designated as the official site for the 2004 ISA Annual Conference. As a Chapter, we are very excited for the opportunity to host this international event and for the second time since the founding of ISA in 1924, to be able to host this event in Pittsburgh! Through the generous support of many local Chapter members, the City of Pittsburgh and Mayor Murphy, the Greater Pittsburgh Convention & Visitors Bureau, and numerous tree-interested groups and organizations, and tree care companies, we will be bringing an excellent conference and trade show to our proud City.

As this year's Penn-Del Chapter Western TCC Chairperson, I am extremely enthused that we have the opportunity to showcase Pittsburgh in preparation for the 2004 ISA Conference. I am asking for your assistance to grow the awareness of trees and the value they add to our daily lives and neighborhoods through the promotion of this industry event. Please pass along the news of this extraordinary competition and bring your friends and family to share in the events of this very special day. H.P.C.C. Day Camp

The Highland Park Community Club has been providing a summer program for children for over fifty years. If you are unfamiliar with H.P.C.C. Day Camp you are really missing a neighborhood gem. Our program runs for six weeks each summer from 9:00 am to 12:00. This year we are in session from June 24th to August 2nd. Parents are free to choose which weeks they are interested in and can sign up for one or all six weeks.

The campers range in age from four through eight years of age. They spend their mornings in small, age appropriate, groups working on activities/ projects or engaged in gross motor activity. We take advantage of the park surroundings and hike to different pavilions for a change of pace and equipment. On Tuesdays and Thursdays we spend an hour swimming in the small Highland Park pool. We are swimming by permit so we are usually the only group in the pool at that time and the city does staff it with a lifeguard. The pool is only three feet deep at its deepest point so if your child does not know how to swim it's not a problem.

Please note our location should be the newly restored Farmhouse in Highland Park. I'm awaiting confirmation and permits from the city . The cost for campers will be \$70.00 a week for HPCC members and \$80.00/wk for non-members. **The late registration fee effective for applications after June 3rd is now in effect. (Early applicants paid \$5.00 less per week.)** A membership to the club is only \$23.00 and entitles you to the monthly newsletter for the whole year as well as the discounted day camp rate.
