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## Candidates Forum February 18

The Highland Park Community Club and the East End Neighborhood Forum will sponsor a **Candidates' Forum** at St. Andrew's on February 18 at 7:30 P.M. Our own Michael Johnson will be the moderator of the forum..

This will be your opportunity to meet the candidates running for election to succeed Councilman Jim Ferlo. As you know, Jim was elected to the State Senate in November and has resigned his seat on Council to take up his new duties in Harrisburg. So we need to have a special election to fill out the remainder of his term, that is, nearly a year UNTIL January 2004. In the May primary, we will select candidates for the November 2003 General Election and the winner of that election, I believe, will serve a full term starting in January 2004.

I think the February 25 election is extremely important. There is no incumbent running, so somebody new and different is bound to win. Although there are endorsed candidates for the two major parties, it appears as though there will be a number of "independent" candidates too — so we don't just have to endorse our parties pick, we can select from a number of "outsiders". So I would encourage everyone who is eligible to get out and vote!!

## January 16 Meeting Highlights

President Lisa Williams called the meeting to order at 7:35 PM.

Mary Beth Steisslinger, a Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy employee and a Highland Park resident, gave a presentation on Highland Park's Entry Gardens, Filtration Plant, Babbling Brook, and Volunteer Restoration Projects. The City expects the fountain at the Park's entrance gardens to be restored by mid-year. The gardens beside the fountain are still under consideration. The filtration plant is successfully filtering Pittsburgh's water, and there may be a spring tour of the plant. The Babbling Brook development, which connects the hillside down from the filtration plant to Carnegie Lake is currently being excavated and stabilized. There are historic trails below this area that need to be cleared after the devastating storm last May. The Volunteer Restoration Project is continuing to work on the forest, glade and meadow areas of the Park in clearing invasive plants and replacing native plants. Possibly, this summer a group of Americorps Volunteers will assist the City's Department of Works and Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy in their efforts in Highland Park.

Mary Beth introduced the new head of the City's Department of Public Works--Highland Park, Damon Blankenship. Damon has worked extensively in forestry and was involved in the redevelopment of other city parks. Damon spoke about his commitment to Highland Park, specifically the maintenance of the Fountain, the Babbling Brook, and historic trails. He presented all meeting attendees with a 1939 pictorial map of Frick Park. He is still on the lookout for any old maps of Highland Park.

David Hance, President of the HPCDC, stressed the importance of the Park's revitalization including efforts to return the entrance to its historic grandeur. The revitalization will work toward the betterment of Highland Park community and its ability to obtain National Historic District status. There will be an HPCDC presentation regarding this in the March HPCC meeting. The HPCDC is working closely with many city and state organizations to handle Heth's Run and its development.

A motion was made and by all Directors present to authorize Lisa Williams to support the CDC's insistence that the Heth's Run Bridge be reconstructed rather than filling in the ravine and just paving Butler St. on the fill. The bridge is important to permit a planned future path from the park to the future river front trail.

A motion was made and approved to pass the 2002-2003 HPCC Budget.

Bob Staresnic was elected HPCC Executive Vice President by the members in attendance.

The Club is in search of a new Children's Committee Chair. The Vintage Center at Highland Avenue and East Liberty Blvd. would like the HPCC to participate in their annual Vintage 5K Masters Race on April 19<sup>th</sup> with children's activities. The HPCC needs a

person to head this committee and work closely with the Vintage Center. Please call Lisa Williams (412-665-3933) if you are interested.

Bruce Robison announced a Neighborhood Forum at St. Andrews for all City Council District 7 nominees on Tuesday February 18 at 7:00 P.M. This is a time to meet the candidates entered in the Tuesday, February 25 special City Council election to fill the seat vacated by Jim Ferlo when he moved to the State Senate.

Dell Ziegler announced the HPCC Holiday Party on Saturday February 22 from 5:30-8:30 at 927 N. Sheridan. All invitees should bring an appetizer or dessert to share and a \$5/per person donation for drinks.

Dell also announced that at the February HPCC meeting there would be a guest speaker from the US Post Office to discuss mail scams directed toward the elderly population.

The Meeting adjourned at 9 PM.

At the Union Project's first board meeting of 2003 we welcomed Greg Mims as our 13th and newest board member. 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## COP's

"Bad boys bad boys what ya gonna do when they come for you..." hah, tricked you. No this isn't an article about one of America's favorite pastimes, watching the trials and tribulations of some of our favorite bumbling criminals on the T.V. show "COP's," instead I'd like to take a moment or two to talk about our own C.O.P.'s otherwise known as our Community Oriented Police officers.

How many of you reading this article were aware of the fact that as of January 1<sup>st</sup> 2003 we lost our C.O.P.?

I first became aware of the impending change a few months ago while I was attending a block-watch meeting in an adjacent neighborhood. The question of "why" was raised and police cited the number of complaints collected through the years. because of negative feedback received, apparently the police department felt that the community didn't like the program or think it was effective.

I should note that after the decision had been reached to drop the C.O.P. program and people became aware of the impending changes, the compliments for the program and concerns about these changes began to fly.

For those that are interested here are my two cents on the issue...

Penny 1- Our C.O.P. was Officer Christine Scalise, but most of us know her as Christine.

Christine has been in our neighborhood for the better part of 5 ½ years. She not only "works the beat" but also attends every one of our community club meetings. She goes to neighborhood events and functions...even when she's off duty. This summer she gave my girls, along with hundreds of kids, bike helmets at the E-Fest event in East Liberty.

During the powerful storm that hit us this past Spring, Christine was on top of the hill (around Heberton Street) to make sure no one got too close to downed power lines. She biked over here from Morningside in the pitch dark to get there. Oh yeah, she did all this on her day off.

Penny 2- Continuity is a critical part of crime prevention.

Pittsburgh's crime rate has been traditionally lower than the national average for a city its size. Recently, however crime rates have increased as convicted felons are put back on the streets. With more convicts on the streets and a stagnant economy staring us in the face, now is not the time to experiment with policing strategies.

I consider myself a reformer, Lord knows I like to look at doing things differently and think "out of the box," but let's not stop an effective program without fully examining the impact on the community-both negative and positive. Decisions like this deserve community input-before the die is cast.

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Now who should you vote for? Attend the candidates forum on February 18 and meet most of the candidates. There was a forum in Lawrenceville a couple of weeks ago with nine candidates present. The forum was extremely well run, each candidate made a one minute opening comment. After that a series of questions were asked, each candidate having one minute to answer each question. There was a timekeeper who was very diligent in enforcing the one minute limit. So the entire event was over in less than two hours.

2. Congratulations to Bob Staresinic, who was elected to be vice president during the January meeting. Congratulations!!!


