February 20 Meeting Highlights

The meeting was called to order by President Lisa Williams.

Lisa welcomed new officers Bob Staresinic, as Vice President, and Stacy Gray, as the Children's Committee Chair. The Hospitality Chair, Kate Zober, has resigned that position, but will continue as the Super Playground Chair.

Lisa received information about the Zoo's Earth Day Extravaganza on Saturday April 26. They were soliciting HPCC for support of the Extravaganza.

Tania Grubbs informed the meeting that HPCC has received a \$5,000 grant from Jim Ferlo's Office--as previously noted in the treasurer's statement. Tania suggested use of the money toward a kick-off celebration of the HP Fountain, after its completion in early summer. She would also like to have some money distributed to the Children's Committee, and some money will be allotted towards the *"Reservoir of Jazz"* in July/August.

Tania also announced that Dilworth Elementary School on Stanton Avenue would like to hold the April HPCC meeting at their school. They are transforming their curriculum into one of full art integration, and the Principal would like to present the new curriculum to Highland Park. Since St. Andrews is unavailable for the Thursday meeting and Pittsburgh Public Schools are closed on Thursday, the HPCC will change the night of the meeting to Wednesday, April 16 at 7:30 PM at Dilworth Elementary School.

Dell Ziegler introduced Joanne Pope, a US Postal Inspector, who spoke about mail fraud specifically directed at senior citizens. Ms. Pope showed a 15 minute video and spoke on identity and consumer fraud schemes, how to take care of unwanted solicitors, and what the US Postal Service is doing to combat mail fraud.

The Block Watch Committee Chair, Jan Stayianos, spoke about

recent crimes in Highland Park. There were 14 drug related arrests on Jackson Ave. and Mellon Street in the past month. A boy was shot on Portland Ave. He has been released from the hospital. On Wellesley Ave. there was a car jacking, but the criminals were caught and the car was returned.

There was a report by Highland Park residents on tow trucks illegally parked on King Rd., Beverly Place, and Negley Ave. There is a city ordinance that disallows tow trucks to be parked on residential streets between the hours of 7 PM and 7 AM, but several local tow truck companies in this area are not obeying the ordinance. The HPCC would like to support these residents of HP in a written letter to law enforcement.

Michael Johnson presented further information about the Community Development Plan in a written outline. Michael also supplied the HPCC with a *"Report on the Highland Park Survey Results v.2."* There will be a third town meeting in early May 2003. In late June the Community Plan process will come to a conclusion. If you have further questions, you can email Michael at mkljohn2@hotmail.com.

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
Union Project Update

Highland Park Community Plan Update

The Highland Park Community Plan is a community-based process intended to enable residents of Highland Park and portions of surrounding communities to design innovative strategies to improve our neighborhoods. This planning process, a collaboration between the Highland Park Community Development Corporation (HPCDC), the Highland Park Community Club (HPCC) and the East End Neighborhood Forum (EENF), is in the last leg of an eighteen- month process that began in January 2002. Since the last article about the Community Plan appeared in the HPCC newsletter, there have been a number of noteworthy events: completion of the Community Plan survey, community outreach efforts, and design of the Community Plan final deliverable.

been available in paper form at local merchants, and in electronic form on the HPCP website, has been very successful; we have received over 500 responses. These responses have enabled the Community Plan to identify needs and concerns in a number of areas: education, public safety, housing, arts/recreation and commercial district. Preliminary survey results are available at the Community Plan website, www.highlandparkcommunity.com (click on "Highland Park Online Library" then "Survey Results"). Generally, the survey indicated that residents have very specific preferences for community services and for quality of life that are not currently being met, and that they are favorably inclined to working with their neighbors to improve the community.

The Highland Park Community Plan has also worked hard to engage the community through outreach efforts. Since early January 2003, a free, publicly-accessible computer with Internet access has been provided by the Community Plan at Enrico's Tazza D'Oro. This computer has been used to take the Community Plan survey, visit Web sites of public officials and government agencies, and other tasks. The Community Plan has continued sponsoring focus groups of local residents to discuss issues related to the planning process: two meetings regarding Bryant St. commercial development have been held since December 2002, and a third one, open to the entire community, will be held in early March 2003. In addition, a focus group on youth concerns will also be held in March 2003. The Community Plan held a holiday party for participants and supporters on December 18, 2002; it was well-attended and featured lively discussions on the community planning process.

The outcome of the community planning process is twofold: a final document (the "Community Plan") containing data, goals, and strategies that provide specific guidance for initiatives that can improve Highland Park, and increased capacity to perform community-based planning and development. The final document will contain information derived from publicly-available data, the Community Plan survey and focus groups. An outline of this document is available in the latest Community Plan update document, available our website o n (www.highlandparkcommunity.com; click on "Highland Park Online Library" then on "Community Plan Status Reports"). We plan to have a preliminary draft of the final report available for public comment by early May 2003; we also plan to have the third and final Town Meeting at which community residents can provide feedback and suggestions regarding the final report.

It is important to emphasize that the Highland Park Community Plan will only identify those goals, and recommend those strategies that come from the community itself. St. Raphael Expands Enrichment Program

St. Raphael School of Morningside is announcing the addition of a before school drop-off program to complement their modeled after school Enrichment Program that has received much recognition.

Representative Preston Joins Affirmative Action Brief to U.S. Supreme Court

State Rep. Joseph Preston Jr., D-Allegheny, has added his name to a brief filed on behalf of several Pennsylvania lawmakers and other officials with the U.S. Supreme Court defending affirmative action admissions policies at the University of Michigan law school and other law schools across the nation.

The University of Michigan admissions policy, which is designed to maintain racial and ethnic diversity at the university's law school, is being challenged as unconstitutional. Preston said he joined other state lawmakers and officials in filing the amicus curiae, or friend-of-the-court, brief because a ruling by the Supreme Court

against the university's admissions policy could have a devastating effect on diversity at other universities across the country, including here in Pennsylvania.

"This is just the latest in a long line of milestone civil rights cases that the Supreme Court has heard over the past half century," Preston said. "The difference now is that we have a Supreme Court that seems poised to turn back the hands of time instead of moving them forward, and a president who seems ready to do the same."

Preston said the brief will argue that the kind of affirmative action admissions policy used by the University of Michigan and other schools is permitted under a 1978 ruling by the Supreme Court (Regents of University of California v. Bakke), which found policies that use racial quotas illegal but affirmed the right of universities and other institutions to use other methods to actively seek diversity.

"The University of Michigan's program is very modest, and does not use quotas," Preston said. "Our fear is that dismantling it will lead to a slow but steady deterioration of minority enrollment not just in specific degree areas, but in higher education overall.

"Minorities, both racial and ethnic, still face significant economic, social and institutional barriers to higher education in this country," he said. "Universities and other higher education institutions, especially public universities created for the very purpose of increasing access to higher education for all residents, should be able to strive for diversity as a matter of admissions policy and a matter of public policy."

Preston said the Supreme Court is scheduled to hear the case (Grutter v. Bollinger, et. al.) in April. Besides Preston, over 30 other former and current state lawmakers and other individuals are parties to the amicus curiae brief, which was filed by Pennsylvania House Democratic Caucus Chairman Mark Cohen, D-Phila.
