April 16 HPCC Meeting Highlights

President Lisa Williams called the meeting to order at 7:37 P.M. in the auditorium of Dilworth Traditional Academy for the Arts and Humanities.

The meeting with Citiparks about use of the farmhouse, mentioned last month, went well. Citiparks encourages community use of the Farmhouse; but they need to know plans well ahead of time. The storage problem has been taken corrected.

In a related note, Lisa introduced the new Children's Committee Chair, Stacey Gray. Stacey announced an Easter egg hunt to take place at the farmhouse on Saturday, April 19th at 10:00 A.M.. Citiparks will help out and there will be an arts and crafts table. Candy and toys will be put in the eggs for the hunt on Thursday, April 17th at 7:30pm at the farmhouse.

Lisa Williams announced that John Cirolli is assuming the chair of the Public Safety Committee.

Dana Thomas spoke about the House Tour. Angie Walker volunteered to be her co-chair. They are tentatively planning the tour for Saturday, October 18. The theme of the tour will be kitchens and cookbooks. While the tour will include many of the rooms in the homes, it will focus on "great Kitchens" and they hope have cookbooks for sale on the tour. They also want to get the "food-oriented" businesses in Highland Park involved, specifically Food Glorious Food, La Foret, Sitar and Enrico's Tazza d'Oro. Because of the extra activities this year, they are planning to raise prices to \$15 advance sale and \$20 on the day of the tour. Dana is looking for volunteers to be greeters in the houses and to sell tickets. Volunteers will work for about 3 hours and will have time to see the houses, too. Dana will have a sign-up sheet at every meeting until October.

Sergeant Ellinger (standing in for Officer Gay) gave a report on neighborhood safety. The problem tenants at 5620 Jackson Street and 811 Mellon Street have been evicted. The owner of 811 Mellon Street is currently on crutches so progress on that property may be slow, but he intends to improve it. Officer Gay responded to the loud music problem at 916 Mellon Street and resolved it. He also is doing his best to act on any tow truck issues. If you have any problems, feel free to call Officer Gay at 412-665-3770. Sergeant Ellinger also noted that there is a new block watch on Highview. There were some thefts from residences and from vehicles but no violent crimes were reported in the neighborhood since the last meeting. There will be a "Pick-up Pittsburgh" on April 26th.

Tania and Jeff Grubbs performed a few musical selections to introduce the evening's program about Dilworth. They are both involved in the programs at Dilworth. They introduced Mr. Bob O'Keefe, the Principal of Dilworth.

Mr. O'Keefe welcomed the club and spoke about the changes that have occurred at the school during the past few years. To improve the relationship with the community, he invited any members of the community to visit Dilworth anytime; he encourages residents PAGE 4 HPCC Newsletter

of Highland Park to join the Dilworth parent - student organization. With the help of Diane DeNardo, a number of Arts and Humanities programs have been developed over the past five years which he is happy to report have the full backing of his boss, Mr. Briscoe, Superintendant Dr. Thompson, Mrs. Darlene Harris and the entire Board of Education.

He introduced two of his staff members who have been instrumental in some of the programs. Mr. Marshall Medrano spoke about the faculty/staff choir that he started and which quickly is developing; they hope to perform in the community in the future. Mr. David Rigo is a Teaching intern currently working at Dilworth. He spoke about the goals of Dilworth as a school of Arts and Humanities. They will maintain all of the standard curriculum for the district, but anchor academic topics with art projects, discussions and special events. Dilworth has already partnered with the Carnegie Museum of Art, the Pittsburgh Opera, the Civic Light Opera and the Center for the Arts. Overall, they have been pleased with the strong support that the faculty has for this focus.

Mr. O'Keefe spoke about a related programs. There is an in-school gifted program called "ACE" for second to fifth graders. They have begun to integrate the teaching of American Sign Language into the program and hope that it will grow into an anchor for the school as a whole. There is no other language taught at Dilworth; he hopes that this is something the school can become known for. He wrapped up by reminding the Club that their curriculum is still grounded in fundamentals. If anyone would like to meet with Mr. O'Keefe one-on-one or have a tour of the school, call 412-665-5000.

Lisa Williams opened the floor for new business. Mike Fiore, the owner of Mike's Auto Body, apologized for any problems his tow truck drivers might have caused residents and said that he is doing his best to address the concerns with his drivers. You can call him directly if you have any problems. He stated that drivers have not been paid by commission since January, in an attempt to keep drivers from racing to the scenes of accidents. He mentioned that the "messy" property next to his building does not belong to him. It is city property and they are supposed to be working to clean it up.

Patrick Dowd reported for Kate Zober that the next Super Playground maintenance day will be May 17th. She will need about 50 volunteers for two shifts of "Mulch Madness". Call her to sign up

Michael Johnson reported on the Community Plan. He identified things that have been learned from the process to date. For example, there are many youths in Highland Park who like the neighborhood and want to give back to the community, but they don't know how. The team also learned that many of the business owners on Bryant Street don't know each other and haven't previously considered ways that they could work together to reach (Continues next page)

common goals. The team has learned of the successes at Dilworth and will consider ways to share these successes with Peabody and Fulton. He said the focus groups will be reconvened once more in the next few months to give input on their sections of the draft master plan. The third and final Town Meeting will be held in mid-June to present a draft of the final plan for comment and input. A Community Celebration is being planned for August to celebrate the neighborhood and the completion of the Community Plan, but most of all as a Celebration of Diversity. Muzz Meyers is coordinating the event which will focus on Bryant Street, but also have a connection to the Union project. Finally, the Community Plan is looking for one or two volunteers to work for the plan doing data analysis and community outreach. Please contact Michael Johnson if you are interested.

Sal Wilcox introduced himself as an owner of one of the newest Highland Park businesses. Education Innovations is the parent company of The Learning Club, which is located at 5808 Bryant Street. The Learning Club offers educational services for grades K through 12, including tutoring and summer programs. The tutoring service includes interactions with the child's school, teachers and test scores to ensure the best possible results for each child.

Lisa Williams adjourned the meeting at 8:33pm and invited everyone to explore Dilworth.

Let us know what times during the day and what days during the week would be best for you. We want to get these locations up and active as soon as possible. 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From the Commander of Zone 5

The Commander of Zone 5 Station on Tow Trucks March 13, 2003

Dear Mr. Rieley

I recently received the Highland Park Community Club newsletter for March 2003. I was particularly interested in the article on Page six titled "Complain about Tow Trucks" in which residents have complained about the number of tow trucks parked overnight in the community and that calling the police is usually ineffective. As the Commander of Zone Five Police Station, I wanted to let you know about the complaint and my efforts to resolve the problem.

On July 30, 2002, I received a letter from Chief McNeilly's Chief of Staff, which indicated that there were some concerns about the illegal parking of tow trucks in the 900 block of Highview Street, as well as on Bossart and Chislett. During the month of August, I had Officers assigned to monitor activity at this location. The Officers did issue a citation to one tow truck for parking in violation of city ordinance 541.03 (g). This ordinance states that no operator of a commercial vehicle, camper, trailer, boat or other vehicle not classified as an automobile, and no owner of the vehicle shall permit the vehicle to park on any street for longer than two (2) hours, between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. of the following morning. The Officers also advised tow truck operators of the ordinance in order to alleviated this situation on Highview Street. In September of 2002, I sent Chief McNeilly a response to the complaint.

On October 2, 2002, I met with some of the residents of Highview Street who advised me that they were still having problems with tow trucks, boats, and commercial vehicles in the Highland Park area. That very same evening, I toured the area following a community meeting and observed a boat parked at Bossart and Heths and a tow truck on Bossart. I later advised Officer Matthew Lebedda, who was the COP Officer at the time, of the situation. Officer Lebedda issued a citation to the tow truck and spoke with the owner of the boat who moved the boat off of the street at his direction. Officer Lebedda also spoke to the family of a tractor trailer operator who had parked his truck near the tennis courts in Highland Park and advised his family of the ordinance. Through his personal skills, Officer Lebedda educated the owners of these vehicles on the law and was successful in getting the vehicles off of the streets.

Zone five Officers continued to patrol the Highland Park Community and have issued numerous citations to commercial vehicles parking in violation of 541.03 (g). Although I do not have copies of every citation, I was able to obtain copies of several citations that were written over the past several months in the area.

Citations were issued in the area on 11/25/02, 11/26/02, 12/2/02 (2 citations), 1/1/03, 1/2/03 (2 citations), 1/3/03, 1/16/03, 1/20/03, and 2/5/03. The Zone Five-Night Turn Lieutenant advised me that this area is checked on a nightly basis and he has noticed a reduction in the number of tow trucks parking on the street.

I recently assigned an Officer to address the abandoned cars on the sidewalk around one local garage in violation of the vehicle code. This prompted the owner of the garage to contact me. The owner of the garage sought my advice on how to resolve the complaints against his tow trucks and his company. Following a discussion with the owner, he advised me that the tow trucks would not park on the street in violation of the ordinance or he would fire them. The owner later sent me additional permit he secured for lots to park his customer's vehicle so that he would not have to park them on the sidewalk. The Officer has continued to monitor the vehicles in and around the business and indicated that the parking situation has improved around the business.

I am committed to enforcing the ordinance and resolving the complaints in the Highland Park area. I would suggest that any Highland Park resident who observes tow trucks, tractor trailers, or boats parked on the street between 7 PM and 7 AM to call 911 to report the complaint through 911. If a tow truck or commercial vehicle is found parked in violation of the ordinance, a citation can be issued. Residents can also forward any information on illegal parking to the Mayor's Service Center at 412-255-2621.

New Union: MEDA & Union Project

Mennonite Economic Development Associates (MEDA) has chosen the Union Project from a pool of six organizations who were nominated by Pennsylvania Senator Rick Santorum and the Pittsburgh Leadership Foundation to receive a technical assistance award funded by the Federal faith- and community-based initiative.

MEDA will begin this process with an organizational assessment of the Union Project on May 2. This assistance will greatly help to build the Union Project's organizational capacity and to complete a professional, viable and market-specific business plan, which is the next big step in our fund raising process.

Neighborhood Beautification

The Union Project is hosting two clean-up days on *May 10 and May 17 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.* Join volunteers from around the neighborhood and around the city to help clean up the Union Project. Volunteers will help to remove debris from the building and do general landscaping work including mulching brush and planting flowers.


We invite you - along with all of our neighbors - to join us in these efforts to build community and beautify our neighborhoods. We also welcome your efforts to pick up trash on your own block and bring your yard waste to be mulched or your picked-up trash to dispose of in our dumpster. At the very least, we invite you to stop by to visit with us, meet some new friends and learn more about the Union Project!

These efforts are part of the ongoing work at the Union Project, which aims to build community through the innovative, participatory and volunteer-driven restoration of a prominent community resource. The renovated building will provide gathering and working space for artists, community builders and people of faith. To date, over 400 volunteers have contributed some 4000 hours of service toward the project.

Arts and Summer Events

From *June 26 to September 25 2003*, a weekly Local Art-Making Market will be held on the front lawn of the former Union Baptist Church at the intersection of Stanton & Negley Avenues. The Market will feature booths selling organic produce, handmade art, and promoting the work of Pittsburgh's arts and faith institutions. In addition, booths will be available for neighborhood artists and others to rent at a minimal fee. The Market will be the area's only continuing weekly grassroots festival, providing an informal setting for people to assemble and enjoy their own creativity and that of others.




believe that learning works best in a relaxed atmosphere."

Around St. Andrew's

The bright spring month of May is always a busy time around St. Andrew's -- with weddings, concerts, special services, and always so many gatherings of good friends.

For music lovers in the neighborhood, Choral Evensong at 8 p.m. on Thursday evening May 1st will be followed by a recital by Highland Park resident and well-known pianist Betty Rieley. Then on Friday evening, May 9, at 8 p.m., there will be a recital by the Urban Sky Consort, a very highly regarded ensemble singing early music composed by women and for women's voices (tickets on sale at the door).

NEIGHBORHOOD E-MAIL OPINION POLLS

Do you support the plan to put soccer fields in Heth's Run? How about the plan to rename the Highland Park bridge in memory of Fred Rogers? Sixty-one Highland Park residents responded to these opinion poll questions on the Highland Park Neighborhood

email list over the course of one week in April. Here are the results.

Question #1:

Do you agree with the proposal to create soccer fields in Heth's Run where the Public Works drop-off site was? If not, what do you think should be there instead?

There was overwhelming support for the soccer fields: 45 "yes" votes, 5 "no" votes, and 11 "other" votes.

Those in favor of the proposal welcomed the soccer fields because they are in short supply and long overdue. Parents would rather take their children to local fields than drive elsewhere. Some predicted that the soccer fields will be examples of good things yet to come in the area, including the replacement of the Heth's Run bridge and the creation of a trail to the river that would eventually connect with other river trails. Also, the proposal echoes an earlier recommendation by the Community Club from a time when the Club had a soccer club but no home field and inadequate practice space. Some of the "no" voters were concerned about the lack of an obvious replacement for the drop-off site. A few others suggested using the space for a driving range instead. Some of the "other" voters raised questions such as whether the former drop-off site was safe environmentally for use as soccer fields; what would the noise be like for residents at the top of the hill; and whether traffic patterns were already too congested at the Zoo entrance. Some didn't even know where Heth's Run was. Some of those who responded also mentioned their desire to have a fenced-in off-leash dog run in the park, perhaps near the Farmhouse. There was also a question of when scrap tires would be removed from Heth's Run considering that West Nile virus is about to breed...

Question #2:

Do you agree with state representative Jeff Habay's proposal to rename the Highland Park bridge in memory of Fred Rogers?

There were almost twice as many "no" votes as "yes" votes: 36 "no" votes, 20 "yes" votes, and 5 "other" votes. Almost all of those who voted "no" also suggested that some other memorial would be more appropriate for Fred Rogers, especially if it were associated with children and/or located in Oakland or Squirrel Hill. Some of those who voted "no" additionally suggested that renaming existing structures was never a good idea and a new monument or memorial should be created specifically for Fred Rogers. Suggestions included something related to the Children's Museum, a school, a cultural center, the zoo, something near WQED, a public space or institution, or a playground, Many of those "no" voters also specifically mentioned that renaming the bridge would make it more difficult to associate with our neighborhood and park. Those who voted "yes" would be happy to have our neighborhood be associated with Fred Rogers.

Day Camp

The Highland Park Community Club has been providing a summer program for children for over sixty years. If you are unfamiliar with H.P.C.C. Day Camp you are really missing a neighborhood gem. Our program runs for six weeks each summer from 9:00 am to 12:00. This year we are in session from June 23 to August 1st. Parents are free to chose which weeks they are interested in and can sign up for one or all six weeks.

The campers range in age from four through eight years of age. They spend their mornings in small, age appropriate, groups working on activities/ projects or engaged in gross motor activity. We take advantage of the park surroundings and hike to different pavilions for a change of pace and equipment. This year we are coordinating some children's activities with the city's community enrichment program and we will be offering an opportunity to visit the roving art cart, story time and mad science. The city has been offering a variety of wonderful programs at the Farmhouse all year and we look forward to collaborating with them this summer.

The campers also spend Tuesdays and Thursdays swimming for an hour in the small Highland Park pool. We are swimming by permit so we are usually the only group in the pool at that time and the city provides two lifeguards. The pool is only three feet deep at its deepest point so if your child does not know how to swim it's not a problem.

Day camp costs \$70.00 a week for HPCC members and \$80.00/wk for non-members. A membership to the club is only \$25.00 and entitles you to the monthly newsletter for the whole year as well as the discounted day camp rate. Please register before June 1, 2003 and save yourself the \$10.00 per week/child late fee.
