Spring is finally here! Longer days, more sunshine, progressively warmer weather and those wonderful showers that make everything so green and bright!

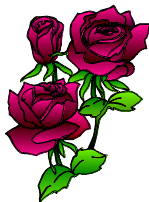
With all the new greenery and flowers blooming everywhere, our Club has some new faces to it as well.

May Meeting Minutes

President Lisa Williams called the meeting to order at 7:35 PM.

Introductions: Lisa introduced the new Public Safety Committee Chair, John Ciroli. Other new attendees at the meeting were recognized.

C.O.P.: Officer Christine Scalise reported the April crime statistics in Highland Park. There was one aggravated assault on Negley and Stanton Ave., 5 residential burglaries, 8 thefts of vehicle, business, and residential, 5 vehicle thefts, and 2 drug related incidences. Officer Scalise said she is working on the abandoned vehicle problems and continuing with drug operations in the 900 Mellon St. block. She participated in the Pittsburgh Clean-Up Day on Mellon St., which she really enjoyed. She stated that the police presence was good for the neighbors on Mellon, and made her feel more responsible for the up-keep of Mellon St.

Super Playground: Kate Zober, Chair of the Super Playground, asked for volunteers for the Super Playground Mulch Madness on Saturday May 17, 9-11 AM. She suggested that volunteers bring a pitchfork, wheelbarrow, and gloves. Coffee and donuts will be provided for the volunteers by T'azza D'oro.

The Park: Mary Beth Steisslinger, of the Pittsburgh Parks Conservancy, reported on the multi-purpose trails leading from the swimming pool down to the velodrome on Washington Blvd.. Mary Beth requested from the HPCC a \$600 grant to sponsor the tree planting aspect of the National Community Conservation Corps (NCCC) Volunteer project on these trails. Mary Beth is the Project Coordinator of the NCCC. The NCCC volunteers will be working for six weeks this summer on restoration projects here in Highland Park. Lisa Williams will ask the finance committee to approve this and then canvass board members by phone. The \$600 will support planting 350 young trees to reforest the slope, re-establish the fast-growing canopy species to shade out invasive plants, plant an under story that will add to the bio-diversity and esthetic quality of the site, and test long term (3-5 years) efficiency of deer exclusion techniques.

Zoning Committee: Dell Ziegler, Chair, proposed reenacting a lapsed resolution to the members of the HPCC. The resolution would give the Chair of the Zoning Committee and/or the Officers of the HPCC authorization to represent the HPCC on all zoning matters. The resolution states that the HPCC is in general opposition to requests for variances and other similar efforts which would: Increase population density, such as three units on a street zoned for two units, or increase space density, such as smaller yards or decreased back or side-yard set-backs or be different from existing zoning for the area, such as commercial or institutional use on a residential street. The Board passed the resolution while stipulating that they would like to receive written reports on attended zoning hearings, and that this authority must take into account the best interest of all Highland Park residents.

Newsletter: Ollie Rieley, editor, asked whether those present thought the Mass Mailing issue is worth the extra cost. A strong opinion that the mass mailing is important in bringing in new members was expressed, and so the July issue will be mailed to all residence addresses in Highland Park, as has been the case for the last several years. A business owner from East Liberty suggested that the newsletter solicit advertising on a multi-monthly basis from other East Liberty merchants who are unaware of the newsletter.

House Tour: Dana Thomas, reported that she has five houses set up for the fall house tour, and is seeking four or five more homes. She would love to have a very large home in Highland Park on the tour. Please phone her if you would like to volunteer your home or have any suggestions, (412) 720-0906.

Highland Park Community Plan: Michael Johnson reported on the status of the Community Plan. The Focus groups will reconvene to ensure the fullest possible community participation in the formulation of goals and strategies. The following dates are set for the final focus groups: Wednesday, May 21, Community Health and Safety; Tuesday May 27, Housing, Neighborhood Maintenance and Infrastructure; Thursday, May 29, Arts, Recreation, and Youth Development; and Monday, June 2, Education. All meetings to be held in the Farmhouse from 7:00 to 8:30 P.M. Please contact www.highlandparkcommunity.com if you would like to participate. The Community Plan has a new volunteer coordinator, Brenda Cole, to assist any residents with their questions. There will be a final Town Meeting the week of June 23. The purpose will be to share the final draft of the community plan with the community, and to hear suggestions and critiques. There will be a community celebration featuring music, food and fun on August 8 or 9th to celebrate the completion of the Community Plan.

Program: Bruce Robison introduced the school board candidates for District 2, Darlene Harris and Patrick Dowd. Mr. Dowd and Ms. Harris each spoke for 10 minutes about why they should be nominated to run for the school board. The candidates remained after the meeting to answer any questions about their candidacy.

Citiparks Prepares for Second Season of Indoor Tennis

Are you ready to begin playing tennis year round? Then wait no longer! In February, Citiparks dedicated a seasonal "air-supported structure" - more commonly known as a 'tennis bubble' - along Fifth Avenue in Mellon Park, Shadyside

A 36-foot-high bubble, made of acrylic and polyester fabric, covers five tennis courts. The Mellon Park Tennis Center - resurfaced with Premier Court, a cushioned hardcourt system - is only the second facility in western Pennsylvania to use this state-of-the-art playing surface. And the new facility includes showers and restrooms in an adjacent structure.

Take advantage of two indoor plans: PERMANENT COURT TIME guarantees a set time weekly on the same court. OCCASIONAL COURT TIME may be booked in advance with prepayment of court fee at time of booking.

Prime-time rates range from \$22/hour (9 a.m. - 4 p.m. weekdays) to \$30/hour (4 - 9 p.m. weekdays and 7 a.m.- 6 p.m. weekends). A special discounted rate of \$20/hour applies to all other operating times (7 - 9 a.m. weekdays; 9 - 11 p.m. weekdays; 6-10 p.m. weekends).

If you're 60 years or older, take advantage of special senior rates on weekdays (offer based on court availability). Play for two hours (noon - 2 p.m. or 2 - 4 p.m.) for just \$7/person. You must arrive or reserve your court one hour prior to the desired session (noon - 2 p.m. or 2 - 4 p.m.)

The Mellon Park Indoor Courts will operate October 2003 through April 2004.

Individuals paying for 2003/2004 reservations by June 30, 2003, will receive a 10 percent discount. For information and reservations, call Citiparks at 412-225-2228.

PLEASE NOTE: The Mellon Park tennis courts remain free to City residents all summer (June - September 2003).

The Highland Park Community Plan: Mark Your Calendars!

Please mark your calendars and join us for one or more of the following important events in bringing closure to the drafting of the Highland Park Community Plan.

1. The Community Plan consultants are reconvening the focus groups to discuss goals and strategies that have been developed around key issue areas. Although not originally planned, the second round of focus groups is intended to ensure as full community participation as possible in the crafting of action steps for Highland Park. Those who've attended previous focus group meetings will receive invitations, but, as is the case with all Community Plan meetings, the groups are open to all interested community members.

All focus group meetings will run from 7:00 to 8:30 PM and will be held in the conference room on the second floor of the Highland Park Farmhouse. The meetings will be convened as follows: - Community Health and Safety: Wednesday, May 21

- Housing, Neighborhood Maintenance and Infrastructure: Tuesday, May 27
- Arts, Recreation and Youth Development: Thursday, May 29
- Education: Monday, June 2

Some of the focus group members have expressed a willingness to continue working together on plan implementation. The Plan proposes that these working groups become community-wide committees and is exploring strategies to ensure that the groups build on previous and on-going community work spearheaded by the Community Club, the Community Development Corporation, and other key community stakeholders.

2. A Town Meeting will be held on Monday, June 23, at 7:00 PM, at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, located at 5801 Hampton Street. All community members are invited to discuss the draft Highland Park Community Plan.

3. A community celebration will be held on Bryant Street during the weekend of August 8th and 9th. Festivities being

planned include music, food, and fun to celebrate the completion of the Community Plan and the launching of community efforts to realize the Plan.

Throughout the planning process, we've heard about a lot of issues, some that are new and some that are not new to the community. For example, we have known for a while, quantifiably and intuitively, that high school age students in Highland Park are opting out of Peabody High School for Allderdice, Schenley, CAPA, and elsewhere. We recently discovered, through our youth focus group, that, although the students are happy with their respective schools and friends, they would like to feel more connected to this community and to other Highland Park High School students. Four leaders of the focus group have identified 25 others to receive a letter to start the "Highland Park Youth Group."

We also know that the community has been talking about "what Bryant Street should be" for a long time. During the community plan process, we discovered that many of the merchants hadn't met each other until we brought them together for a focus group. Some are now interested in developing a joint marketing piece about Bryant Street. They feel the district is safer and better than it's ever been, but they need more lighting to feel safe and secure in the evening hours.

The Community Plan is a process of taking these kinds of issues and turning them into doable strategies with real accountability. It is a framework for small, incremental changes, that, over time, add up to real change. If you've been involved, we hope that you will stay involved. If you haven't joined us in this effort, we invite you to join us now.

Day Camp

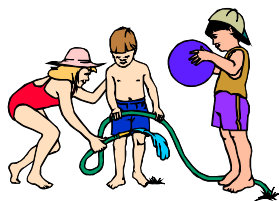

The Highland Park Community Club has been providing a summer program for children for over sixty years. If you are unfamiliar with H.P.C.C. Day Camp you are really missing a neighborhood gem. Our program runs for six weeks each summer from 9:00 am to 12:00. This year we are in session from June 23 to August 1st. Parents are free to chose which weeks they are interested in and can sign up for one or all six weeks.

The campers range in age from four through eight years of age. They spend their mornings in small, age appropriate, groups working on activities/ projects or engaged in gross motor activity. We take advantage of the park surroundings and hike to different pavilions for a change of pace and equipment. This year we are coordinating some children's activities with the city's community enrichment program and we will be offering an opportunity to visit the roving art cart, story time and mad science. The city has been offering a variety of wonderful programs at the Farmhouse all year and we look forward to collaborating with them this summer.

The campers also spend Tuesdays and Thursdays swimming for an hour in the small Highland Park pool. We are swimming by permit so we are usually the only group in the pool at that time and the city provides two lifeguards. The pool is only three feet deep at its deepest point so if your child does not know how to swim it's not a problem.

Day camp costs \$80.00 a week for HPCC members and \$90.00/wk for non-members. A membership to the club is only \$25.00 and entitles you to the monthly newsletter for the whole year as well as the discounted day camp rate.
