The business meeting of the HPCC board was limited to a few announcements. I apologize to all those who showed up expecting an extensive discussion of HPCC business.

The meeting was a good one though. Mayor Murphy gave a good presentation of the current financial situation with lots of numbers and figures. Whether you agree with his reading of the situation or not, it was informative to hear. The Mayor's office has promised to send copies of his presentation so all those who missed it can be informed. Contact me if you would like to see a copy (and I hope they send them to me by the time this newsletter gets to you). The Mayor is asking everyone to contact their elected state legislators urging them to make the hard decisions about changing the tax structure for the City.



Since we did not get to discuss much business, there are several items I have to update you on:

1) The Super Playground cleanup was postponed due to weather and lack of interest. It will be rescheduled for a later date when more people will be excited to help maintain this neighborhood treasure (Big Brothers Big Sisters of Greater Pittsburgh mention it as one of the places to go in their Guide for New Matches).

2) The Spring Children's event is scheduled for April 3rd at St. Andrews Church from 1:00 - 3:30 P.M.. Not only can you bring your kids, but there is fun in helping to make it a success. Bring a neighbor.

3) The Pittsburgh-To-Harrisburg Mainline Canal Greenway Draft Master Plan is almost ready to be distributed. 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
meeting. If not, get some info at www.alleghenyridge.org.

March Meeting Highlights

Fulton School hosted the monthly meeting of the HPCC on March 18, 2004. Club President Bob Staresinic called the meeting to order at 7:35 P.M. and introduced Fulton Principal Marlene Taylor. Ms Taylor welcomed the Club to Fulton and introduced several students and VIPs including teachers, volunteers and parents before showing a slide presentation highlighting student in-house activities and recent field trips. As home to over 200 K-5 students, one of Fulton's great strengths is the energy of its student body - Ms Taylor's presentation showcased the efforts of students and faculty along with community helpers to use their time together productively. Ms Taylor invited the community to visit Fulton at any time and made a tour of the school available after the meeting concluded.

Mayor Tom Murphy's appearance was the much anticipated focal point of the March meeting. Mayor Murphy spoke and answered a number of questions from the audience. While our summary can hardly do justice to the far-reaching volume of information he shared, the Mayor left us after a non-stop hour with the distinct impression we had been treated to a virtuoso civics lesson, with a generous helping of Economics 101, and State-of-the-City report - held together by the seemingly boundless enthusiasm the Mayor holds for our city, our neighborhoods and our future. The successful growth and development initiatives this Administration has brought to fruition are somewhat tempered by the City's current fiscal challenges. But maybe because Pittsburgh is experiencing so much activity on both "fronts" the Mayor's talk truly had something of interest for everyone ranging from hard-number/hard-nosed political realities to eco-friendly discussion of managing sprawl. In a call to action the Mayor urged everyone to participate in the political process and to support resolution of the City's financial problems by urging State legislators to permit a broader tax base and a more fair distribution of the tax burden.

Before adjourning the meeting, Bob Staresinic informed everyone the Super Playground Clean-up has been postponed, the deadline for voter registration is March 29th, and announced an April 6 meeting of the Friends of the Riverfront



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



Vintage realizes and cares about the temporary inconvenience the race creates for our neighbors. Below are alternative route directions to plan your race day travel in advance. North Highland Avenue will be closed from Penn Circle North to Highland Park along with all Park entrances and exits.

From the West:

To Butler Street/Highland Park Zoo

Take any side street to North Euclid. Turn north, follow North Euclid to end. Go left on Bunker Hill, turn right on Mellon Street. Follow zoo signs.

To the other side of North Highland Avenue:

Follow above directions to Mellon Street. Turn right on Mellon. At the fork in the road, bear right onto Lake Road. Follow Lake Road 1.1 miles. Make right onto Connecting Road. At top of hill turn right, then make an immediate left onto Farmhouse, and an immediate left onto Heberton.

To Penn Circle: Go south on North Euclid to Penn Circle.

From the East:

To Butler Street/Highland Park Zoo

Through Highland Park, follow side streets up to Heberton at Grafton. Take road to the right (Farmhouse Drive). Turn right onto Connecting Road and make immediate left. Go left on Lake Road. Continue on Lake Road 1.1 miles to stop sign. At stop sign turn right for Butler Street and the bridge. Turn left to return to Highland Park on the west side of N. Highland Avenue.

To the other side of Highland Avenue.

Take any side street to Collins. Turn south and follow Collins (it turns briefly into Negley Run Blvd. and then back into Collins after crossing East Liberty Blvd.) to Penn Circle and turn right onto Penn Circle. Go across N. Highland Avenue and make a right onto N. Euclid.

School Board Views

The Pittsburgh Board of Education has two important responsibilities. First, the Board must guarantee the safety and the academic success of all our students. Second, the Board must guarantee the long-term financial health of the district. In early March, the Superintendent and the Board announced a plan to reduce the district's excess capacity in facilities. This plan will strengthen both the academic performance and the financal health of the Pittsburgh Public Schools.

We all know that the Pittsburgh Public Schools must reduce the excess capacity in facilities. Currently, the district has space for over 50,000 students, but only about 34,000 students attend our schools. This means that everyday the district is operating with an excess capacity of 31%. Furthermore, the Board knows from demographic studies that the enrollment of the district is projected to decline even further over the next five years. In the face of these challenges, the Board must carefully manage resources for the students of today and tomorrow.

The Board believes that by reducing excess capacity the district can concentrate its resources on the education of each child. Simply put, the Board can choose either to pay for empty seats or to pay for educational programs. This Board wants to concentrate district resources on students and, therefore, will realign our resources to reduce excess seats. On a school level, this will mean different things. It might, for example, mean the presence of more literacy coaches, more tutors, even new more educationally appropriate facilities. In some schools it might mean the presence of full- rather than part-time art, music or physical education teachers. In other schools this might translate into the creation of before- and after-school programs. In the future, it might mean establishing pre-kindergarten programs. The Board believes we should be delivering these and other programs that improve the quality of education for our students. This Board wants to pay for programs, not empty seats.


The overall plan proposes closing 15 of the district's 86 school buildings to reduce capacity by approximately 4,400 seats. This would reduce our excess capacity, but it would still leave the district with approximately 10,000 extra seats. The proposed realignment would achieve a projected operating savings of \$8.1 million a year. The realignment would also help the district realize a one-time savings of \$13.8 million by eliminating projected capital costs.

At this point, the Board is taking comments, suggestions and criticism from the Pittsburgh community. The proposed plan will not be voted on until there has been sufficient interaction with the community. It is the hope of all Board members that after working with the administration and the community, we will be able to implement solutions that will improve the quality of education while also preserving the resources of the district.
