## Union Project announces Christmas Market

The Union Project, an east end non-profit organization that is restoring the former Union Baptist Church to provide gathering and working space for artists, community builders and people of faith, has announced the opening of a Christmas Market.

The Union Project has partnered with local farmers Neil Stauffer and Susanna Meyer on this innovative Christmas fundraiser. Christmas trees, wreaths, and other Christmas decorations will be on sale at the Union Project, on the corner of Stanton and Negley Avenues, beginning Monday, November 29 and continuing until Christmas. Hours will be 11 A.M. to 9 P.M., seven days a week.

Trees will be priced between \$20 and \$50, with proceeds going to benefit the Union Project restoration project. The Union Project will be selling a wide variety of trees including Frasers, Blue Spruce, Canaan, and Concolor. All trees are grown locally on a tree farm in Indiana County. Additionally, there may be opportunity to special order LIVE Christmas trees.

This unique Christmas market is a nice compliment to the Summer Arts and Farmers market that is offered at the Union Project every June thru September. The summer market provides opportunities for local farmers and artists to sell their wares, while at the same time providing free arts opportunities to children.

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# HPCC Meeting Highlights October 21, 2004

Meeting called to order at 7:35 P.M.

**Treasurer's Report**: There is no new budget yet. Committees should submit their budgets as soon as possible. The checking account balance is \$9,055 and dues are still coming in. On a related note, the community development grant was approved and Bob is in the process of filling out the paperwork to get reimbursed for the \$6,000 that has been spent already.

**Board Member Elections**: Board members whose terms are over as of this meeting were thanked for their service. Mike Nadler and Kate Carrigan, nominees for two of the available board member positions, introduced themselves to everyone present. By separate votes, both of them were unanimously elected as board members of the Highland Park Community Club. Bob Arnold who was introduced and nominated at the previous meeting, was also elected director. Most present members remembered him. The other nominees to the board were absent and so were not voted on.

**Public Safety Committee**: Jan Stayianos reported that the Mayor Service Center line will be discontinued in January. She also learned that building permits will now be required for roofing, hot water tanks and windows. It is likely that this change is due to the adoption of the International Building Code. There will also be a 75% cut in the city's demolition budget.

According to Mike Nadler, a build up of complaints about a particular landlord can generate fines and liens on their personal property, so he urged everyone to keep calling the police about nuisance properties with absentee landlords.

**Highland Park Working Group**: The wall on Bunker Hill has been fixed and the progress on the park entry continues and should be done in time for the spring hat luncheon. He also noted that there is a City Planning hearing on October 26 concerning a city council ordinance to allow advertising within the parks (areas like tennis courts, etc.)

**Highland Park History Group**: The first meeting will be meeting on Veteran's Day evening at the farmhouse. There will be discussion of the historic district designation for the neighborhood, Alexander Negley and any other items brought by interested parties. **'Noises in the Night'**: Dave Klahr and Commander Rochelle Brackney spoke about a noise issue in the area of the neighborhood near the farmhouse. Dave and a number of his neighbors have heard suspicious and loud noises at a variety of hours, mostly at night. According to Commander Brackney, local police need to go through training in order to use 'Flash-bangs' in the field. These are devices that produce a tremendous flash and noise, but are not lethal. They are used to provide distraction in a hostage situation. It is possible that between 7 and 10 on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, this was the bothersome noise that was heard. Outside of that time period, the noise was not coming from the firing range. She also noted that there will be no more training with these items this year, and next year when it is time for further training she will notify the neighborhood via the email list and a posting at Enrico's Tazza D'oro two weeks in advance.

If anyone in the neighborhood hears anything loud or suspicious, don't hesitate to call 911. Commander Brackney can track these calls, send techs in to look for evidence and try to determine a good location for setting up surveillance. It is possible that kids are 'blowing up' plastic bottles, and these kinds of items leave evidence behind that can help track them down.

The commander also noted that Morningside neighbors have formed a daytime walking group, and that group was partially responsible for catching the serial burglars in the area. Highland Park residents are encouraged to walk around the neighborhood and urged to report anything out of the ordinary. It was noted that it is always good to write down a description before calling 911, because it is easy to get confused after giving the operator your name, location, etc. One last piece of advice was to video tape your belongings to make them easier to identify them if they are stolen and also to help with insurance claims. Bike thefts are still a problem. They have lots of recovered bikes in custody at Zone 5.

**Zoning**: It was noted that there is a hearing for a house on Elgin Street. It is an application for an owner to watch children in her home. The neighbors are supportive and Del sees no reason to protest. There is also an application for a liquor license at Sitar, but it seems that it is just a transfer of ownership and not a new request.

**Bryant Street**: Rudy noted that there is a new Photography Studio and a new Hair Salon in the business district and that Crystal Radiance is moving out.

**Halloween**: St. Andrews will be having an event for kids on Sunday, October 31st at 8pm. All are welcome.

**Holiday Party:** There is some interest in organizing a holiday party again this year, probably sometime in January. Kelly Meade and Kelly Vitti will start coordinating it and Del Ziegler will provide them with financial information from past years.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:09 P.M.

With the 2004-2005 school year well under way, the Pittsburgh Board of Public Education continues its work in a number of important areas. In recent months I have used Education Committee time for gathering information on issues related directly to improving student achievement. Among the many issues, three seem to be of particular importance for parents and citizens in Pittsburgh.

In late August, we learned that under the federal "No Child Left Behind" law the Pittsburgh Public School District was placed on the School Improvement I list. As a district the Pittsburgh Public Schools have failed to make adequate yearly progress towards federal achievement standards. In particular, the district experienced difficulty with an achievement gap in math and reading, with attendance and with graduation rates. At this point, the administration is working to craft a "District Improvement Plan" which must be submitted to the Pennsylvania Department of Education in November. This plan will indicate how Dr. Thompson's administration will move the district to address these areas of concern. The Education Committee with hold hearings on this plan, which will be made available to the public. I will make a copy of the plan available on my website (www.patrickdowd.org). If you wish to comment on the plan you are encouraged to speak at the monthly public hearings. (call 412.622.3600 for information)

For many months, the board has also been pressing the administration to make a concerted effort to work with parents and the legal system to address the problem of chronic truancy. Long before the NCLB sanctions, we well knew that attendance was an essential ingredient to improved student achievement. We have also known that in certain communities high rates of truancy exist and might be contributing to a growing achievement gap. The board has been pushing the administration to employ the districts data system to collect more accurate information and to file electronic citations with district justices. The board also expects the administration to work with parents and to make every effort to get all children to school so that they can learn.

Perhaps most importantly, the board is working diligently to address the question of superintendency. As has been widely reported, Superintendent Thompson's contract comes to an end in July of 2005. As a board, our most important responsibility will be to establish firm leadership for the future of the district. As I recently wrote in an opinion piece in the Post Gazette, I believe the school board must aggressively lead the effort to establish a new foundation for accountability in the Pittsburgh Public Schools. (for the full text of my article go to www.patrickdowd.org) Accountability begins with the board, which is elected by the public. In its turn, the board will seek to hold the superintendent accountable for district performance through the creation of a new "accountability contract." This new contract must be based entirely on the concept of measurable performance. It must clearly articulate objectives regarding academic performance and timeframes for key milestones to be attained. It must also offer a modest base salary in conjunction with powerful incentives for successfully meeting the objectives.

At our September 22, 2004 Legislative Session, the board passed two important resolutions on superintendency (for the full text go to www.patrickdowd.org). The first resolution, which we refer to as the "Section 1073 Resolution," states that the board notifies "the incumbent Superintendent that another or other candidates will be considered by the board for the office of Superintendent for the period starting July 1, 2005." In the second resolution, the board authorized the appointment of legal counsel to serve as our negotiator. Additionally, we authorized our counsel to negotiate with Dr. Thompson for a period not to extend beyond December 1, 2004. In essence, the board is reserving its right to consider other candidates for the office of superintendent, while simultaneously seeing if an agreement about a new type of contract might be reached with Dr. Thompson. In this way, the board is seeking to preserve all of its options for securing firm leadership for the future of the Pittsburgh Public Schools.

The board will continue its efforts in these and other areas. As always, I want to thank those of you who have taken time to either call, write or meet with me to share your views and concerns regarding the Pittsburgh Public Schools. #### New Stained Glass Classes Announced for 2005

In this class you will learn to repair and restore stained glass windows. This course will take you through simple repairs to complete disassembling and reassembling of historic 100-year-old stained glass church windows. Completed windows remain the property of the Union Project. You will learn how to cut and replace broken or missing glass, glaze, lead, solder and putty a window. This course will give you enough background to make your own new stained glass windows or restore your historic windows. The class fee is \$175. The class is open to students of any skill level.

Weekend Intensive class will cover the same restoration skills as general classes. Cost for this class is \$250 and includes lunch on 2 days. This class is open to students of any skill level and can accommodate only 10 students.

New Design Class will cover restoration skills as well as stained glass design techniques. Students in this class will design and build new Union Project "logo" windows to be installed in the Union Project building. This class is recommended for students with previous stained glass experience and is limited to 10 students.

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
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### Around St. Andrew's

And we mark our calendars as we look ahead to December. Thursday, December 2, 8 p.m. Choral Evensong for Advent, with

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
