September. The start of a new year for the HPCC. The past year has been a good one, and there were lots of great activities. Jim Ferlo (and their staffs) for assistance in securing grant money from the PA Dept of Community and Economic Development. The HPCC received \$5,000 thru Sen. Ferlo's office, which was used for the mass mailing of the May newsletter, and allowed us to let all residents in Highland Park know about the activities in the area. The HPCC received \$10,000 thru Rep. Preston's office, which was used mainly for the Reservoir of Jazz concerts. The ROJ was a success again this year, with beautiful weather for each concert. New this year was the addition of activities for the kids, where they were able to do some crafts and create instruments. They then were able to play along with the musicians at the end of the evening.

Also at the meeting, we held elections. I would like to welcome Monica Watt, Eric Randall and Brenda Cole as new members of the Board. I would also like to thank Dave Delong, Lisa Solomon, Peter

Hughes, Ollie Rieley and Bruce Robinson, who are leaving the Board, for their service over the past 3 years. I was re-elected as President, Dell Zeigler as VP, and Kelly Vitti as Treasurer. Welcome to Amy Enrico, who was elected as Secretary.

Some great musical events will be featured this month at St. Andrew's, and the entire neighborhood is warmly invited.

On Thursday evening, October 6th, our regular service of Choral Evensong, featuring the St. Andrew's Choir, will be followed immediately with a recital on the organ by our good friend Rebecca Rollett, Artistic Director of the Pittsburgh Camerata.

The St. Andrew's organ will be featured also on Sunday afternoon, October 9, when Gerry Senechal, Organist and Choirmaster of St. George's Episcopal Church, Nashville, Tennessee, will be in recital at 4 p.m. The recital program will be preceded, at 3 p.m., with a lecture on Ernest M. Skinner, one of the premiere organ builders of the early 20th century, who built the St. Andrew's Organ in 1913.

Gala dessert receptions follow both of these events.

Also on the calendar at the end of the month--and a great event for ALL ages, is our annual Halloween Organ Recital (brief and fun, with music appropriate to the evening) and Costume Party, beginning at 8 p.m. on Monday evening, October 31. Treats will be distributed at the end of the event.

Looking ahead to the beginning of November, St. Andrew's announces our Second Annual All Saints Music Festival.

The Festival this year begins on Tuesday, Nov 1st, at 8:00 p.m., with a Choral Eucharist for the Feast of All Saints. Featured music will be the Mass for Four Voices, by the 17th Century composer William Byrd, sung by Sine Nomine, Alan Lewis, director. Clergy leadership will include the Rev. Lawrence C. Deihle, Priest Associate of St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Oakmont, as Guest Preacher, the Rev. Jean C. Chess, Deacon, and the Rector of St. Andrew's, Celebrant.

On Wednesday afternoon, November 2nd, at 5:30 p.m., we will enjoy a Service of Choral Evensong for All Souls Day, sung by the Choirsters of Calvary Episcopal Church, East Liberty. That service will be followed by a recital by Amy Goldstein, soprano, St. Andrew's 2005-2006 Choral Scholar and a student at Woodland Hills High School. Amy's program will include music by Scarlatti, Gluck, and Mozart, English and American Folk Songs, and a medley from "My Fair Lady."

On Thursday, November 3rd, at 8:00 p.m. our regular "First Thursday" service of Choral Evensong will feature St. Andrew's Choir, under the direction of Peter Luley, singing the service by Herbert Howells, in G major, and the anthem, Justorum animae, by C.V. Stanford. In recital that evening will be pianist Linda Morgan Ellison.

On Saturday, Nov 5th, at 8 p.m. the Festival continues with a program, "Faire House of Joy," a program of solo



HPCC Meeting Highlights September 15, 2005

The meeting was called to order by President Bob Staresinic at 7:39 P.M.

Reports

Treasurer: Kelly Vitti reported that the August checking account balance was about \$16,100. There are also two CDs worth about \$3,392 each.

President: Bob reported that contracts have been received to be signed for the state money. One for \$5,000 to cover the mass mailing, which was supported by Senator Ferlo's office and one for \$10,000 to help support the Reservoir of Jazz, supported by Rep. Preston's office.

Block Watch: Jan Stayainos summarized the recent crime statistics. She also noted that a group of young teens was beaten-up by an older group behind Dillworth School. One teen required three days at Children's Hospital. Police were called but there are no known results.

House Tour: Bridget Naylor reminded everyone that the Tour is coming up on Saturday, October 1 from 11 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. The tour will present the King Estate plus nine other homes, the Union Project, St. Andrew's, some of the CDC restoration projects and the restored fountain at the park entrance. She encouraged everyone to attend. They have ordered fine fall weather for the day. She also noted that they need ten more volunteers. Also would like someone to hang more posters, especially in the Mt. Lebanon area.

The house tour committee will have a thank you party for home owners and volunteers on October 22.

Newsletter: Lisa Williams noted that anyone who hasn't gotten recent newsletters should call Membership Chair Kelly Meade who maintains the mailing list.

Yard Sale: Kelly Vitti reported that there was a good participation in the yard sale and a lot of customers. She reported a profit of about \$1000. Kelly noted that Judy Wolfe says she'll be back next year.

Children's Committee: Rachel Matos reported that there will be a Harvest Party November 5 at the Farm House (outside). She is looking for volunteers to help for one to two hours the day of the party. Call her to volunteer.

Reservoir of Jazz: Bob Staresinic reported that this year's series was a great success. It ran for five weeks with great weather each Sunday. There were planned children's activities including making play instruments and playing with the band at the end of the concert. Thanks to Tania Grubbs, CitiParks, the sponsors, the bands and the volunteers who made it all possible.

Beautification: Dana Thomas asked for input on areas the Beautification Committee should work on. Some ideas already being considered include picking up litter, clearing

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out the grass and weeds growing in the cracks in the sidewalks or at the curb, trimming tree branches that hang down and obstruct sidewalks, etc. Call her with any other suggestions. She's is posting handbills to remind residents to clean-up yards and walks for the day of the house tour so that we present our best face to the visitors for the tour.

New Business:

Changes to the Bylaws: A revised set of bylaws for the club was presented in the September newsletter with a call to vote on the changes in this meeting. Del Ziegler summarized the changes as follows:

- Change the name of the organization from Highland Park Community Club to Highland Park Community Council
- Reduce the size of the elected board from 15 to nine. Starting with tonight's election, three board members would be elected each year. Serving board members who have been elected will continue in office until their terms are up. (That is, the class of 2006 and 2007 will remain five members, so the elected board will not be nine until after the 2007 election.)
- Eliminate Vice President of Community Development and Immediate Past President as officers and board members.
- Change terminology for the office of Vice President from Vice President Elect to Vice President.
- Reduce number of standing committees by eliminating the Recreation and Community Development Committees from the list of "Standing Committees". Of course, these two may be activated as appointed committees when needed.

During the discussion there was concern expressed over the name change - perhaps we will lose our recognition. It was explained that the change to Council from Club will reduce the misconception that the organization is primarily social or exclusive. By retaining the same initials, we hope to retain recognition.

A motion to approve the bylaw change was made, second

and passed.

Election of officers:

The nominating Committee presented the following slate of candidates: Directors: Brenda Cole, Monica Watt, Eric Randall. President: Bob Staresinic; Vice President: Dell Ziegler; Treasurer: Kelly Vitti; Secretary: Amy Enrico.

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No nominations were made from the floor. The slate was elected as presented.

Program:

Judge Alan Hertzberg introduced himself and briefly talked about his work as judge in the Family Division of the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas. He noted that he intends to stay in the family division, he believes it is very important and necessary work. His approach is to put the kids first. He is 48, married with three children. The family lives in the West End.

Meeting adjourned at 9:05 P.M.
